Finally, on 30<sup>th</sup> June, **Big Lottery Fund** reopened for business. Their new programme from 2010 to 2015 is very similar to the old Investing in Communities Programme

The 3 key funding strands keep their names:

- **Growing Community Assets** aims to help communities have more control and influence over their own future through ownership of assets
- **Life Transitions** aims to support projects that help people at key times of change, helping them to make their lives better for the future
- **Supporting 21<sup>st</sup> Century Life** aims to support projects that build stronger families and stronger communities.

However, the types of projects they are keen to support and the outcomes that the Big Lottery expects to achieve have been restricted. In order to bring about lasting change, equalities, environment and empowerment must be at the heart of the projects supported. BLF believe that they are connected and that communities and organisations that take them to heart will be stronger and achieve better outcomes in the long term. Before you apply you should consider equalities, environment and empowerment in the design and delivery of your project. For Growing Community Assets this means that you involve the whole community in developing your project, your project is sustainable, your project develops skills and that your community overcomes disadvantage and inequality through your asset.

**Investing in Ideas fund** which supports initial planning with grants of up to £10000 has also been re-launched.

**Management and Utilisation of Scots pine in the Northern Periphery** - 24-25th August 2010 Strathpeffer Spa Pavilion, Strathpeffer, Ross-shire. Book online at: <http://www.keycs.com/events.asp> The first day of the conference will be focused on the management of Scots pine forests. In the morning there will be a series of presentations relating to Scots pine management in northern periphery countries, including the impacts of silviculture, results of a survey of Scots pine quality in Scotland and methods for assessing and forecasting quality. In the afternoon there will be field visits to Cawdor Estate to view examples of Scots pine management for the production of quality timber. On the second day the emphasis will be on processing, marketing and utilisation of Scots pine timber. The morning session will include presentations relating to the end-use properties of Scots pine timber, marketing initiatives in Finland, preservative treatment of Scots pine, trials of Scots pine timber cladding and construction of a bird hide showcasing the use of Scots pine timber in construction. The afternoon will include visits to the bird hide constructed as part of the project and other buildings.

### **UK Landscape Award 'Showcasing the best projects in the UK'**

The UK Landscape Awards are looking for the best landscape projects in the UK. Good landscapes, wherever they are, help make great communities. A new town square, a restored coastal path, a regeneration scheme with public space at its heart, all make a contribution to how well a community works.

The UK Landscape Award was created by the European Landscape Convention and helps to implement it in the UK. The winner will become the UK's entry to the Landscape Award of the Council of Europe (COE). The landscape might be newly-created, it could be the improvement or renewal of an existing landscape or perhaps it has brought new life or community involvement to an existing place. All types of landscape - urban, rural, peri-urban (urban edge), suburban, coastal, agricultural, industrial, designed, natural, cultural, appealing to or designed for children - are eligible to enter.

The Award is a great opportunity for organisations to showcase their best landscape projects, highlighting their role in making good places and establishing community involvement in the process.

**Entries close on 27 August 2010.** The winner will be announced on 8 November 2010 at the European Landscape Convention Conference in Liverpool. The UK winner will then be submitted to the Council of Europe's European Landscape Award which will be announced in March 2011. **Community Wildlife Fund** - The BIG Lottery Fund has announced the launch of its new Community Wildlife Fund. Through the fund not for profit groups, local councils, schools and health bodies can apply for funding of between £300 and £10,000 for projects that will bring together local people to discover, enjoy or protect wildlife in their local area by improving rural or urban environments for people to enjoy, and by getting people more active and healthier. Example projects include; protecting wildlife habitats; creating a nature trail, woodland walk or wildlife garden for people to enjoy; improving natural community spaces, such as rivers, ponds and woodland; exploring parks, rivers and the countryside to look for rare or endangered species; encouraging people to take up gardening or go on nature walks; providing opportunities for children to learn about nature through play. There are three deadlines for applications. The first deadline is the 21st July 2010, followed by the 22nd September and the 24th November 2010. **UK Mammals Grants (UK)** The People's Trust for endangered species is inviting applications from voluntary conservation organisations, scientific researchers, individuals and consortia, needing financial support for work that relates to the conservation of mammals in the British Isles and Eire, to apply for funding of up to £30,000 through their UK mammals grant programme. The trust aims to fund scientific research, practical habitat management work, reintroduction and monitoring programmes and educational projects. Projects supported in the past include; Bats in the Lake District; Monitoring of UK bat species in underground sites; and monitoring Irish pine martens. **Heritage Lottery Fund Heritage Grants Scheme** The next application round for the Heritage Lottery Fund's Heritage Grants Scheme for projects over £1million and under £5million is the 9th August 2010. Under the Heritage Grants scheme funding is available for projects that relate to the national, regional or local heritage of the UK. To be eligible for funding a project must help people to learn about their own and other people's heritage, conserve the UK's diverse heritage for present and future generations to experience and enjoy; and help more people, and a wider range of people, to take an active part in and make decisions about heritage. HLF welcome applications from single organisations and partnerships. Priority is given to not-for-profit organisations, and partnerships led by not-for-profit organisations. If private owners are involved, HLF expect the public benefit to be greater than any private gain. In addition, the HLF also makes grants of £50,001 - £1 million; and Grants in excess of £1 million. **Lush Charity Pot Funding Grants** of a few hundred pounds to a maximum of £10,000 (although the average grant awarded is £3,000) are available for small grassroots charities, community groups and non-violent direct action groups working in the areas of environment / conservation; animal protection; and human rights. The funding is being made available through the Handmade Cosmetics Company's Lush Charity Pot. In the past, nearly all its grants have gone to small organisations with a turnover of less than £250,000 per year. The company are particularly keen to support projects that create change and aim to get to the route of the problem. They also prefer to fund project costs rather than core costs but occasionally fund salaries. Applications can be submitted at any time.

**Biomass Heating Scheme** A final call has gone out to small-medium sized businesses across Scotland encouraging them to take advantage of Scottish Government funding that will help them make the switch to biomass heating. Applications are being invited for the Scottish Biomass Heat Scheme, which will give grants to small and medium sized businesses to install renewable heating systems. To reach European climate change targets, the Government wants to increase by tenfold the amount of renewables used for heating in Scotland. The Scottish Biomass Heat Scheme is managed in partnership between Scottish Government and Forestry Commission Scotland. Projects must clearly demonstrate that they can be complete by March 2011. Therefore projects which have a completed specification,

planning permission, match finance in place and can demonstrate a secure fuel supply will be a priority for fast-tracking. Applicants should submit an initial enquiry form that outlines their project details, however if a project is to be considered for fast-tracking to the full assessment stage, a full application must be submitted. **Senior Volunteering Opportunities in Adult Education** Organisations working in Adult Education and Lifelong Learning that are interested in setting up a senior Volunteering project with a European Partner Organisation will be able to apply for funding in early 2011 under the Grundtvig Programme's Senior Volunteering scheme. Grundtvig, which is part of the EU's Lifelong Learning Programme funds training opportunities for adult education organisations, staff and learners. Senior Volunteering projects funding aim to build a lasting collaboration with another European organisation around a specific theme or activity or target group, through the exchange of volunteers. Organisations can send senior adult learners (aged 50+) to spend 3-8 weeks as volunteers at your partner's organisation in another country. You will also host the volunteers they send. The volunteers can be involved in any non-profit making activities, so long as they provide good learning opportunities. These may be formal, non-formal or (most usually) informal activities.

There is no application form and very brief guidelines for applicants. To apply, you should write to the director of the Trust, giving details of; Your charity and its aims; How much your project will cost; The size of the grant requested; How much has already been raised and from whom How you plan to raise the shortfall. You should include an annual report and any other documentation that you feel could support your appeal. Grants range from £1,000 to £250,000, but most will be for less than £10,000. The foundation can support capital projects, endowments, scholarship funds, research programmes and research funding. **Woodland Trust 'More Trees, More Good'**, launches on 30 June. This will replace Tree For All. The campaign sets out a longer-term aim of a UK rich in native woods and trees, enjoyed and valued by everyone. To achieve this, for every native tree that exists in the UK today, another needs to be planted. An ambitious tree planting movement which everyone can take part in.

To help achieve this, the campaign offers a range of support:

- Helping in the development of schools in underprivileged areas
- To assist in the treatment and care of those suffering from mental or physical illness of any description or in need of rehabilitation as a result of such illness. This can be through the provision of facilities for work and recreation, or the support of research into the causes and cures of diseases. To support any other purpose which is deemed to be charitable.

**Woodland Grazing Forestry Commission Scotland** a new grant aimed at boosting woodland grazing. The joint initiative between Forestry Commission Scotland, and Scottish Natural Heritage will help put Scotland's livestock to work enhancing the environment, economic and public amenity value of the semi-natural native woodlands across Scotland. Grants will be provided through annual payments of £87/hectare/year for a period of five years and this can be supplemented with additional Woodland Improvement Grant funding. The National Farmers Union (NFU) will be holding a series of workshops focusing on woodland grazing best practice as well as the grant application process.
